Preventing Bullying in Your Child's Life

Bullying typically occurs when few adults are on hand to deal with the problem, and when victims are reluctant to report what has occurred, both out of fear of possible repercussions and because they're simply not convinced that adults will be able to make the bullying stop. Even when adults are aware that bullying is occurring, the net result is that adults end up intervening in only four percent of bullying incidents. Wondering what you can do to help stamp out bullying? Here's what the experts suggest:

1. Make it difficult for bullying behaviors to take root by fostering a climate of empathy in your home. Don't tolerate cruelty in any form, whether in real life or in the form of nasty jokes on sitcoms or other forms of entertainment. Let your child know that he has a right to insist that others treat him with respect and dignity.

2. Make sure that the no-bullying policy in your family applies to grownups as well as kids. You can't criticize your child for bullying her friends or her little brother, and then turn around and use bullying tactics on her.

3. Keep an eye on your child's choice of entertainment. Limit your child's exposure to violent video games, lyrics and TV programs, as well as violent toys such as guns—basically anything that glorifies violence or suggests that violence is an acceptable means of solving problems.

4. Keep an ongoing dialogue with your child about bullying. Discuss any bullying stories that happen to be in the news. That way, if your child encounters any bullying problems in his own life, he'll be more likely to open up and talk to you about those problems.

5. Encourage your child to make friends. Bullies are more likely to target children who are loners, so having friends can provide a measure of protection against bullying.

6. Teach your child the importance of body language. A child who exudes confidence and who appears to be in control is less likely to get picked on than a child who sends off less confident body signals.

7. Be alert to the warning signs that your child is being bullied. Children are often reluctant to tell teachers and parents that they are being bullied, either due to embarrassment or a fear of reprisal, so it's important to be on the lookout for the warning signs of bullying.

8. Explain the difference between tattling and telling to your child. Make sure that your child understands that there's a world of difference between tattling (telling on someone simply because you want to get that person in trouble) and telling (reporting a serious problem to an adult). Kids need to know that it's okay to report instances of bullying to parents and teachers.

9. Encourage bystanders to blow the whistle on bullies. Bystanders have an important role to play in discouraging bullying. Bullying behavior typically stops within 10 seconds if another child intervenes. Given that there are bystanders on hand in fully 85 percent of bullying instances, peer intervention is perhaps the most powerful weapon available to help combat bullying.

10. Find ways to hold bullies accountable. When parents get involved and insist on restitution—that the bully find a way to make things right for the victim—bullying becomes a much less attractive proposition for the bully. Bullies need to know that the adults in their life will not tolerate such behavior and that they will be held accountable for their actions.

No Child Left Behind Announcement

The "No Child Left Behind" federal law created higher standards for teacher qualifications in public schools across the United States. Under the new federal law, all parents of children attending a school which receives Title I funds have the right to know the professional qualifications of the classroom teachers and paraprofessionals who instruct their children. We are proud to report that 99.92% of all Cherry Creek School District regular education classroom teachers met the "highly qualified" standard during the 2009-2010 school year. Should you wish to request information regarding the license and degrees held by your child's classroom teacher or the qualifications of a paraprofessional, you must complete a Teacher/Paraprofessional Qualification Request Form. This form may be obtained in the Office of Human Resources by calling 720-554-4327.

School of Choice

School of Choice applications for the 2011-12 school year are available in all schools and the District Admissions offices. Forms must be fully completed before being submitted, and will then be date & time stamped by district staff as received. All transportation arrangements become the responsibility of the family choosing this option.

Requests are approved based on available space with priority given to siblings of current students already attending that school and the children of district staff according to negotiated employee policies. Notification of acceptance or denial of the request will be sent from the schools to parents by March 15, 2011. If your student is currently attending a School of Choice or IntraDistrict Transfer to the highest grade level, it is NOT necessary to complete a School of Choice application each year. Non-Resident application will be available starting April 1, 2011.

CCSD ADOPTS NEW ACCREDITATION SYSTEM

One hundred percent of the schools in the Cherry Creek School District are in the top two plan categories of the new school performance framework recently developed by the Colorado Department of Education. None of the district's schools are in the bottom two categories.

Cherry Creek's new system uses the state's School Performance Framework (SPF) as the basis for assigning schools to accreditation categories. The Colorado Department of Education (CDE) developed the School Performance Framework, also in response to Senate Bill 163. The law identifies four indicators which must be included in the SPF:

- Achievement (percent of students scoring proficient or advanced on CSAP tests)
- Growth (how much growth students displayed on CSAP from last year)
- Growth Gaps (achievement differentiated by race free and reduced lunch, special education and English language proficiency).
- College and Workforce Readiness (ACT scores, graduation rate and dropout rate)

The State Board of Education, in conjunction with CDE, established state-wide performance targets for each indicator.

Under the SPF accreditation system there are four accreditation categories for schools. They are:

- Accredited with Performance Plan meeting or exceeding state performance targets
- Accredited with Improvement Plan approaching or meeting state performance targets
- Accredited with Priority Improvement Plan not meeting state targets, requires state supervision and rapid improvement
- Accredited with Turnaround Plan school performance is well below state targets and state intervention is required

Ninety-four percent of Cherry Creek schools fell in the highest plan category (Performance Plan) compared to 62% of schools statewide. Six percent of Cherry Creek schools were in the second highest group (Improvement Plan) compared to 21% of schools statewide.

School districts may adopt the School Performance Framework for accrediting the district overall, and may choose their own labels for accrediting schools. The Cherry Creek School District has decided to use the state's categories for accrediting each of its schools to create a consistent system.

"This is strong evidence that the Cherry Creek School District is a high-performing district that prepares students for success in higher education and the workforce," said Board of Education President Aagje Barber. "We are proud of our academic excellence and our commitment to closing the achievement gap."
