Dear Meadow Point Families,

I want to thank all of you for such an incredible first half of the school year. The teachers and students at Meadow Point are amazing. So far it's been a success because of a strong partnership between home and school. It's that time of year that we need to talk about the importance of attendance. Research consistently shows that students who have good attendance generally achieve higher grades, enjoy school more and are more employable after leaving school. Our goal is to foster self-discipline in students as well as foster a desire to contribute to a positive school climate and community.

In addition, Colorado law requires children to be in school. Under the School Attendance Law, children of legal age must attend school a certain number of hours each year. It is the parent's/guardian's responsibility to make sure children attend school and arrive on time. When children are missing school frequently or are tardy often, parents risk sanction and may be referred to the Cherry Creek School District Attendance Review Board and ultimately the Arapahoe County District Court.

Tardies, in particular, are not only a detriment to the student who is late to school, but their late arrival disrupts the learning of all the students in the class. The best perspective on this impact is from the teacher. Here is a teacher perspective on students arriving late...

If a child is tardy, their anxiety level rises because they know they are going to be walking into class late. They get to the classroom door and walk in. All the other kids are already working on their first assignment for the day. The others have already turned in their homework, sharpened their pencils, made their lunch choices, turned in their lunch money, and listened to the morning announcements. As they walk in, the others are now distracted by the interruption, and they feel all eyes on them as they pass by. They don't have a sharp pencil. They don't know what lunch is. They have lunch money but it s already been sent down to the cafeteria. They don't know what to do on the assignment. Those 5 minutes have set the tone for the rest of the day.

Students begin coming into class at 8:40 and prepare for the day. This maximizes the precious instruction time for each day by allowing kids time to settle in and prepare for the day ahead. Even being late five minutes has an impact on the kind of day your child will have.

Therefore, we ask that you make every effort to make getting your child to school on time a priority. Its importance cannot be understated.

Ultimately, if a child is absent or tardy, he or she is missing the opportunity to be with an extraordinary educator. As the old proverb goes, "One thousand days of diligent study cannot equal one day with a great teacher."

Thanks to all of you for your consistent and diligent efforts in getting your children to school on time. It is one of the most important things you do every day. The habits and attitudes about school attendance that you share with your child today will set the tone for their success later in life.

School of Choice

School of Choice applications for the 2011-12 school year are available in all schools and the District Admissions offices. Forms must be fully completed before being submitted, and will then be date & time stamped by district staff as received. All transportation arrangements become the responsibility of the family choosing this option.

Requests are approved based on available space with priority given to siblings of current students already attending that school and the children of district staff according to negotiated employee policies. Notification of acceptance or denial of the request will be sent from the schools to parents by March 15, 2011. If your student is currently attending a School of Choice or IntraDistrict Transfer to the highest grade level, it is NOT necessary to complete a School of Choice application each year. Non-Resident application will be available starting April 1, 2011.
