Have you recently heard of Professional Learning Communities (PLC) and wondered what educators were talking about? This has been mentioned at PTO meetings, at Back to School Night and frequently referred to in the district as "PLC." A Professional Learning Community is what we are creating in schools to best meet your child's needs. It's a process, not a program. It is about the power of collective intelligence. It is about focusing on student learning, and not just "covering the curriculum." It is about organizing teaching around student achievement.

At Meadow Point Elementary, teachers are working together linking learning with improvement. There are four priorities for professional learning communities:

Focus on student learning Focus on collaborative culture Focus on results Provide timely, relevant information


During the afternoon from 1:30 – 3:30 PM, grade level teachers, in collaboration with special education teachers, ELA teachers, GT, Reading Recovery, Enrichment and mental health, use collective analysis of data measuring student progress. The driving questions in our collaborative meetings are:

- 1. What is it we want every student to know? (Essential Knowledge)
- 2. How do we know if he/she has learned it? (Assessment)
- 3. How do we respond when a student is not learning? (Time & Support/Remediation)
- 4. What do we do when they already know it? (Prior Knowledge/Enrichment)

The complexity of the educational enterprise today, the growing demands on resources and the energy of educators make us think about how to work smarter, not harde, in order to best meet your child's needs.

Here is how you are seeing professional learning communities in action at **Meadow Point:** 

- 1. A master schedule was developed and implemented to provide collaborative planning time for teachers.
- 2. Grade level collaborative teams were created and meet throughout the year.
- 3. Collaborative teams analyze data (standardized test scores, common assessments and classroom assessments) to answer the four questions listed above.



4. A school plan was developed and is being implemented to support measurable student achievement.

Professional learning communities are an important part of what teachers do every day at Meadow Point. Together we share and increase our understanding of how to continue to develop a school environment with instruction that responds to the needs of our students. It is time well spent having discussions with our colleagues. # **Bully Proofing Update**

### Bully Proofing Update-How do children protect themselves from becoming good victims?

A key part of bully proofing is not having good victims. There are certain things we tell students to avoid doing because the reactions lend themselves to being a victim and can perpetuate bullying. These include crying and getting upset, fighting back and keeping quiet about bullying. It is very important students know how to respond if they find themselves in situations where they are feeling unsafe, not respected or bullied. We teach several strategies so children know what to do and do not feel passive and helpless.

The six strategies we encourage are summarized by the phrase HA HA SO. (Hopefully some of you have al ready heard your student refer to HA HA SO.)

Help—Students are given ideas about various ways to help. Inviting another student to play to remove them from a difficult situation can be helpful. Including others so they are not alone and vulnerable to a bully is another way to help. Also, going for adult help for more serious is strongly encouraged. Students are expected to help because speaking up and strength in numbers are keys to bully proofing.

Assert-Students have been taught assertive stateme	ents to express how	they feel and ask for the	bullying to stop.
We encourage students to start the statement with '	"I Feel	when you	Please stop."

Humor-This response involves a student making a joke about him/herself or the bullying remark. Again, this is to let the bully know you are not going to let the comment hurt you. We clarify that the joke is about what is said not about the bully.

Avoid-This response is strongly encouraged in that students are told to walk away from a situation where someone is trying to make them feel bad or is threatening them in some way. We encourage students to use this after they have made an assertive or humorous response.

Self – talk — These are things students are encouraged to say to themselves silently. The comments should be good things about themselves or the way they are handling a situation so that they feel more empowered and are less likely to believe the bully.

Own-It — This response requires the student to agree with the bully primarily to get themselves out of a situation. So if someone says they have an ugly shirt, they simply agree and walk away. We talk about agreeing as a way to stay safe and again, not believe the bully. We encourage students to use self-talk and avoid along with own-it.

We encourage parents to talk with students about these strategies and which ones they use. If your child comes home telling you about a situation, ask which part of the HAHASO they used to respond to the problem. The more practice they have, the better they will get at seeing what options are available to avoid being a good victim. In addition, we encourage students to spend time with others who are kind, caring, and fun. Thank you for all your support this year and we look forward to more bully proofing next year.
